European Parliament:

EP questions on Brexit: Members of the EP (MEP) can submit questions for written answer to the European Commission (among other EU Institutions). The content of questions is the sole responsibility of their author(s), and a MEP can submit a maximum of five questions per month.

European Commission:

- <u>Pending and planned legislative proposals for the purposes of Brexit preparedness (state of play 12 June 2018)</u>. This list is indicative and does not preclude the addition of other items, in consultation with the European Parliament and the Council.
- <u>European Commission and United Kingdom publish Joint Statement outlining further</u> progress in Article 50 negotiations.

European Council:

- Council authorises opening of negotiations with WTO members on Brexit-related adjustments: The Council has authorised the Commission to open formal negotiations within the World Trade Organisation (WTO) on how to divide up existing EU tariff rate quotas (TRQs) between the EU27 and the UK. After Brexit, the EU will continue to apply its scheduled commitments for goods, but its existing quantitative commitments, in particular the TRQs for agricultural, fish and industrial products, will require adjustments to take into account the fact that the EU's WTO schedule will no longer be applicable to the UK.
